WNPCT: Advocacy and Community Engagement

Wooten Neighborhood Plan Contact Team (WNPCT) provides input on city planning priorities and recommends amendments to city staff, specifically in rezoning cases. The team seeks representation from property owners, residential renters, business owners, and any neighborhood members who rent or own property in Wooten. The contact team advocates for our neighborhood, ensuring our interests are represented, especially if neighborhood-based intervention is necessary.

There are no membership dues. The team meets on the first Monday of each month, typically at a local eating establishment.

The team has four positions: chairman, vice chairman, secretary, and attendance keeper. The website provides more information, including contact information and team activities.

Nature Watch

[A study published in 2019](#) shocked Americans when it revealed that we had lost more than **3 billion breeding birds** in the last half century. Habitat loss is the main driver of such steep declines, particularly in grassland birds. However, there are other factors much closer to home – literally – that you can address by making simple changes to your daily life.

I hope that you'll take a moment to engage on these three important issues to promote bird conservation and make Wooten and our city safer for our non-human neighbors.

Prevent window collisions.

Birds have trouble with glass. Sometimes it's so transparent that they can't see it. Most of the time, the issue is reflectivity: that is, they see vegetation reflected in the window and attempt to fly there. The impact always stuns them and often kills them.

This is an issue that cities across the country are mitigating through working with building owners; Austin, in fact, is leading the charge by

considering [code amendments](#) to require bird-friendly glass on certain new buildings, which I'm hopeful District 4 will support.

Your house is just as important, and it's easy to reduce the risk of birds crashing into your windows. Apply patterned stickers (like those from [FeatherFriendly](#)) to help birds distinguish glass from natural surroundings.

Keep your cat indoors.

We love our cats, and they can't help themselves – they love to play, and their instinct is to be a natural predator. But they are a real problem for local bird populations. By [some estimates](#), they kill more than 2.4 billion birds in the U.S. annually. You can help by simply keeping your cat indoors!

Easy on the pesticides.

These days, across our neighborhood, I'm encouraged to see folks transitioning from the old school green lawns that require lots of water and treatment to more native landscapes (Wooten Park, for example, has a lovely native garden!). Leaning into this trend will be suitable for bugs and birds alike. The [chemicals and other poisons](#) we put into the environment have toxic ripple effects throughout our local ecosystem – so please be thoughtful with your yard!

Wooten Schools Update

Austin ISD School Consolidation Plan

In early October, the Austin Independent School District (ISD) released a proposed plan for school consolidations and district-wide boundary changes. As part of this plan, Austin ISD intends to close 13 schools and modify boundaries for others. These changes are driven by declining enrollment and a resulting budget deficit.

After extensive feedback from the neighborhood and concerned parents, Austin ISD decided to keep Wooten a neighborhood school and to keep some current English/ESL students in temporary programs, rather than fully non-zoning it as initially proposed. Wooten will still become a dual-language campus, incorporating Reilly Elementary's Spanish dual-language program and adding a Mandarin dual-language program.

Welcome back, Wooten students!

After being away for over a year, the Wooten students and teachers returned to their new and improved school on January 6th! Wooten neighbors helped teachers unload and unpack on January 5th, the day before classes started. A big thanks to Claire Simmons and Redeemer for organizing the volunteers. Over 30 neighbors helped Wooten teachers in addition to the Redeemers volunteers.

DID YOU KNOW?

According to Wikipedia, the term “hootenanny” was coined in the Appalachian area of the United States in the early 1900s and was a placeholder for something that didn’t have an official name. Synonyms included “thingamajig” and “whatchamacallit.”

The first use of the word to describe an event was documented by Pete Seeger in 1941, who reported that a political club voted to use it to describe their musical fundraisers. It just barely beat out the term “wingding” which is defined by Merriam Webster as “a wild, lively or lavish party.”

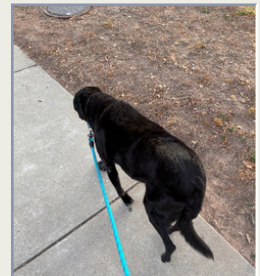
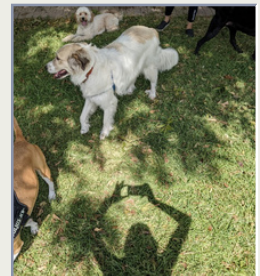
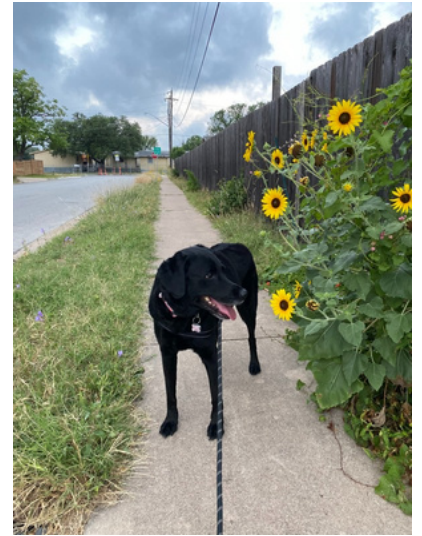
Since moving to Wooten, my mornings have followed the same routine. I'd wake up, put on my glasses, change into walking clothes, and grab the leash. If I wasn't up by 7 am, Sophia's wet nose would nudge me until I got out of bed or she'd change her strategy by jumping on the bed to bother my husband—licking, nudging, or making him move—until he woke me up.

We'd start our walk on Fairfield Drive, and depending on her mood, head toward Ohlen or Kromer. At first, we walked three miles, then two, and near the end, about three-quarters of a mile. Those walks meant a lot to me and were a highlight of living in Wooten. They helped me explore the neighborhood. I got to see the beautifully decorated house on Polar and Beckett during the holidays, the house on St. Carlos with its decorations during COVID, neighbors tending the park beds, and all the changes in the houses around us.

Those walks also gave me the chance to meet many wonderful neighbors and hear what was happening in their lives, along with neighborhood concerns—like why some people walk their dogs off-leash at the park. These connections led me to get involved in the neighborhood association.

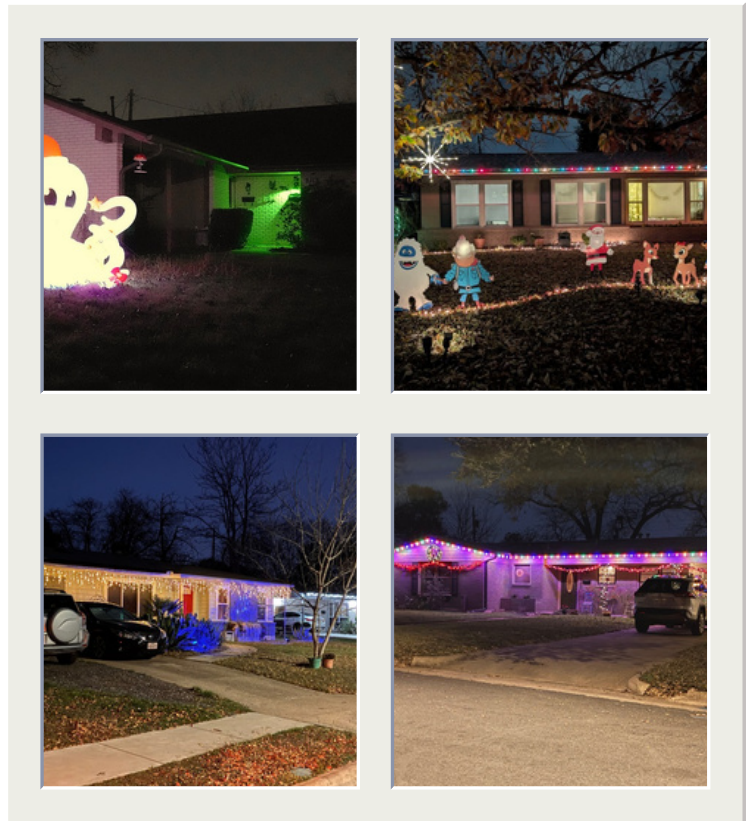
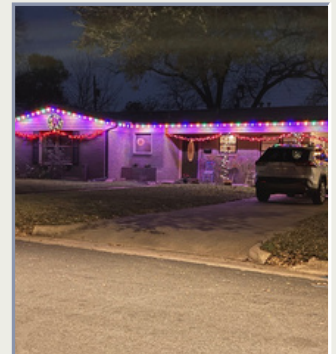
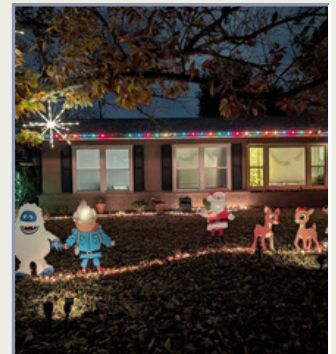
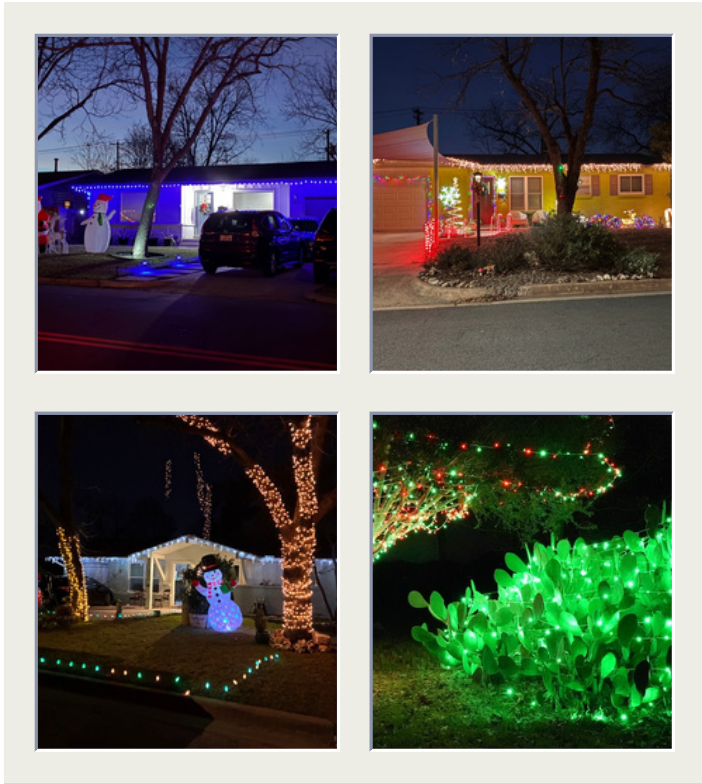
